Stay fluent with Key Stage 2 5 a day



Arrange your eight straws to make 3 squares, all the same size.


Joins

Find the lowest possible score.


Try joining five numbers.

Do you agree with the statement? Use evidence from the text to support your answer.


Read Maya Angelous Memoir (link below) and answer the questions using full sentences.

Gurmit paid £21 for five presents.




- For A and B he paid a total of £6.

- For D and E he paid a total of £9.



He could then pay any sum of money from 1p to 15p, without opening any bag.


How many pennies did Ram put in each bag?




Listen to/read the story of Harriet Tubman (link below) and answer the questions using full sentences.

The History of Father's Day:

Father's Day was founded in Spokane, Washington at the YMCA in 1910 by Sonora Smart Dodd, who was born in Arkansas. Its first celebration was in the Spokane YMCA on June 19, 1910. Her father, the Civil War veteran William Jackson Smart, was a single parent who raised his six children there. The very first Father's day was because Sonora wanted to thank her dad for raising six children on his own.

If you could choose a special day to celebrate someone, who would you choose and why. Make a poster-you can lay it out however you wish. Make sure you include a picture; the person's name; the date you wish to commemorate them and how you would celebrate the day. You can make up as many rules for citizens to follow on this day.

Make a Father's Day Card, or a card for someone special, thanking him or her for everything they do. You can use a template or design you own.
